Year 9 Lifelah trip

Some of our Year 9 students had the opportunity to visit Southampton Universitys Lifelab suite. They were able to participate in a range of activities all linked to health and well being. Activities included being able to view the veins/arteries in their necks using an ultrasound, measuring their blood pressure and even learning some very important CPR skills.

In the afternoon, they were lucky enough to speak to some of the scientists working in the hospital; an immunologist, a data statistician and a microbiologist. They were able to share information about their job and how this impacted the hospital.

Finally students were able to carry out an electrophoresis on some DNA samples. They had to use some specialised equipment to separate the DNA and were able to compare different samples.

This trip was part of our participation the Universitys' health

and well being research, which culminated in this trip.

Challenge Day

Wednesday 8th February was our second Challenge Day of the year and saw students taking part in a range of interesting and exciting activities designed to add to the 'Much More' experience.

Year 7 spent a day looking at what makes them British. Several weeks of preparation in class including experiments, information gathering and planning were brought together in a wonderfully exuberant showcase with topics ranging from the impact of vaping to climate change.

Year 9 had a more serious day, with a range of workshops from Prison Me? No Way! One of the highlights of the challenge day programme, students had workshops on issues such as county lines, saw the reality of a prison cell and heard emotive talks from people who had committed crimes but were now determined to help others from making the same mistakes. While hard hitting and at times emotional, the day had a real impact on students who were able to see the consequences of split second bad decisions first hand.

Year 10 continued their careers journey by exploring the purpose and structure of CVs before writing their own. They also had two sessions with English teachers preparing for their GCSE literature exam

Year 11 continued their path towards their GCSEs by taking part in Maths and English walking talking mocks, exploring growth mindsets and taking part in a wellbeing focused PE session. Exams are approaching rapidly so all sessions were carefully focused on helping them achieve their goals.

EASY GARTER/KNIT STITCH PATTERN FOR BEGINNERS

Colour A Red (one ball will make a lot of poppies!) Colour B Scrap of Black or a black button

BODY OF POPPY

- 1. Using Col A cast on 120 stitches.
- 2. Rows 1-4 Knit

- 3. Row 5 Knit 3 stiches together across the row (40 stiches)
- 4. Rows 6-9 Knit
- 5. Row 10 Knit 2 stitches together across the row (20 stitches)
- 6. Rows 11-14 Knit
- 7. Row 15 Knit 2 stitches together across the row (10 stitches)
- 8. Cut yarn leaving a tail of about 20cm
- 9. Thread tail through yarn needle and slip all the remaining live stitches onto the yarn tail and pull tight. Pull around into a circle and then mattress stitch (or use whatever stitching you normally use) to seam for an invisible seam. Sew in ends.

CENTRE OF POPPY

1. Using B, cast on 16 sts. Cast off. Coil into a tight spiral and sew base to the centre.

Or use a black or green button with 4 holes and sew to centre of poppy. Add pin.
