#### Year 7 at Staunton

Year 7 recently visited the stunning location of Staunton Country Park for their first school trip. Students explored their local area using their map reading skills and team work whilst orienteering and completing the folly trail.

used by Sir George Staunton. A folly is a garden ornament that Sir George used to decorate his land and represent different aspects of his life. One of the most obvious follies is the shell house next to the steps at the entrance to the house.

#### Year 7 Humanities Trip

Across two days all students from Year 7 had the opportunity to go on a Humanities trip exploring the local area and how the Humanities subjects help us to understand our place and within this.

Across a range of subjects this term, students are exploring questions of identity and what it means to be part of our local area, and this trip helped them put this learning into context. Across the two days, students went on a trip to explore Portsmouth and Hayling Island, to find out about our local history and discover what is meaningful to people in our local area.

At Hayling Island, students walked along the beach, talking to members of the public to collect data on how tourism affects the area. Students also completed field sketches and identified how land across the sea front is used. On the Wednesday, students did all of that whilst braving the rain and driving wind! At Portsmouth, students visited Portsmouth Cathedral to explore questions of meaning, faith and tradition in the local area before walking up to Portsmouth Museum to find out about the history of the local area - the exhibition on the history of Portsmouth Football Club was particularly popular!

Overall, it was a fantastic trip which will complement students' learning in the classroom going forward.













#### **Cuffley Adventure Trip**

We were lucky enough to go on a residential to Cuffley Adventure Centre on Thursday and Friday last week. It was a fun filled two days where the students took part in a variety of activities.

The majority of activities focussed on problem solving, teamwork and resilience. This was therefore a very valuable experience for all involved. Many tasks were challenging and students were stretched throughout. Our students experienced failure many times which in turn built resilience for future tasks. It also led to a greater satisfaction when they were eventually successful.

It was a pleasure to take the students on this trip. Their behaviour, effort and enthusiasm was clear to see from getting on the coach until our return.




#### Macbeth

The Scottish play was performed for our Year 10 students in the darkened theatre with eerie lighting and scary supernatural witches lurking in the aisles. Students got to experience both moments of fun and fear with this modern direction of Shakespeare's Macbeth. The creepy and ghostly setting was created by the visiting Candlelit Macbeth performers and designed to support our students to be able to get a closer understanding of Shakespeare's famous play, for their GCSE Literature exams later in the year.

The performers deliberately use low lighting to create a memorable performance for young audiences, hence the name Candlelit Macbeth (although they are using LEDs). The play ended with a spectacular brandishing of sparking swords in the final battle scene. Students enjoyed the performance and many asked the actors questions about the play and their characters in the Questions and Answer session held at the end.







#### Financial Education Corner

#### What we have been doing in school...

The past fortnight has seen Year 11 in their SMSC sessions discussing and learning more on topics such as:

- What is included in a payslip
- The taxes we pay and where this money goes
- The importance of a pension
- Auto-enrolment into a pension

In the coming week students will be taking a closer look at money and mental health in conjunction with world mental health day on Tuesday 10 October.


"It is a lot of money to pay for bills, which is ridiculous alongside the tax as well. It must be hard to survive if you don't have a job that pays a lot. I am definitely going to open a bank account if I can get £175 for just doing that! I am going to see if my dad will give me half of the money to lodge and then I'll pay him back later."

#### Informing you...

Energy bills fall by an average 7%: From October to December the energy price cap kicks in, for every £100 you currently pay, you will now pay on average £93. Despite this, energy costs remain high and with no £400 energy support many especially lower users will end up paying more than last winter.

#### Some need to knows:

- 7% average varies depending on location, usage and company so shop around.
- Get a smart meter and record your usage so you are not paying for units at higher rate especially around time of price changes.
- Consider switching providers, good deals with Octopus and E.on currently but do your research. Stick, switch or fix your energy tariff – MoneySavingExpert
- Free insulation may be available to you especially if you are in council tax band A to D. The Great British Insulation Scheme - MSE (moneysavingexpert.com)
- Cut your energy usage by closing doors, clingfilm on your windows to draught proof your home, don't leave chargers or red lights on overnight.

# Special Educational Needs and Disabilities at Park

#### Welcome to the first edition of Park's SEN newsletter!

This is an exciting opportunity for readers to find out what is happening in school to support our students with special educational needs; opportunities to be signposted and find out what is available in the local community and to be updated on any relevant information around SEND.

#### MEET THE TEAM

#### Mrs Leach

I would like to introduce myself as the new Special Educational Needs and Disabilities Co-Ordinator (SENDCo) at Park. I joined the school in September and have been made very welcome by the whole community. I was SENDCo at



an all-through school in Portsmouth and have over 10 year's experience in the role. I am very excited to be joining the team at Park and helping to improve student outcomes.

I lead a large team of support staff who work with the students in all aspects of school life. In each newsletter I would like to introduce you to a member of the team. This week, meet Mrs Hiles!

#### Mrs Hiles

Hi, I'm Mrs Hiles, Teaching Assistant, and I have worked at Park Community School within the SEND team since January 2022. I have recently passed my Level 3 Teaching Assistant with SEND apprenticeship,



I support our students with physical disabilities including carrying out physiotherapy sessions, support students with SEND (predominantly in the lower school) and carry out reading and literacy interventions with our students. I am thoroughly enjoying my time at Park - the apprenticeship taught me so much that I can apply to my role. I find it very rewarding supporting all of our wonderful students on a daily basis and making a big difference in a small way.

#### Working with parents/carers to support your children using the Assess – Plan – Do – Review cycle

Parents and carers often approach the school as they are concerned that their child may have an unidentified need in school. This could be due to lack of progress in learning or concerns regarding behaviour. To support with this process we will carry out the APDR cycle to help with identification.



This cycle is part of the "graduated approach". This is the approach recommended in the SEN code of practice. This process helps the school to put a plan in place. When we review the plan, parents/carers and the SEND team can decide what worked and what didn't in that cycle. We can then change the plan as needed to help the child or young person make progress.

The SEN Support Plan must include "SMART" outcomes. These are Specific, Measurable, Achievable, Realistic, Timebound

Putting a robust plan in place is not a quick fix and getting it right can take time. It is recommended that a plan can be in place for a half term before it is to be reviewed. This allows time for strategies to be put in place and embedded. It is also whilst completing this process that we can work collaboratively to decide if it is necessary to refer to outside agencies for additional advice, support and guidance so that your child can reach their potential.

#### External support for parents and carers - SENDIASS


SENDIASS stands for Special Educational Needs & Disabilities Information Advice & Support Service.

#### Reading at Park Community School

This term our Year 7 tutor read is Ghost Boys by Jewell Parker Rhodes. Ghost Boys is a moving story that sensitively incorporates historical real-life incidents from history. Poignant and gripping the novel explores how children and families face the complexities of race in today's world.

Twelve-year-old Jerome doesn't get into trouble. He goes to school. He does his homework. He takes care of his little sister. Then Jerome is shot by a police officer who mistakes his toy gun for a real threat. As a ghost, watching his family trying to cope with his death, Jerome begins to notice other ghost boys. Each boy has a story, and they all have something in common. Bit by bit, Jerome begins to understand what really happened - not just to him, but to all of the ghost boys.
