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
Reading Museum Art Trip



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Winchester College Trip

Firstly, after we arrived at Winchester College, we attempted to build model cars from bottles, straws, and milk bottle caps to measure the velocity of the cars. Afterwards we headed to the wind tunnel room to test the effects of drag on different vehicle types and shapes. This was very exciting and helped us understand physics on a deeper and more engaging level.

Afterwards we were given a tour of the chantry chapel which is incredibly rare because of the library in the upstairs. The chapel had lots of stunning stained glass where people would pray for loved ones in purgatory. We were also taught the history of some historic clubs and people from the college's past such as Mallory who climbed mount Everest on three separate occasions. After that we headed to the history library to see some Elizabethan artefacts such as money, songbooks from King Eric XIV, official royal documents bearing Queen Elizabeth's seal, and a silver plate and jug carried by servants for the wealthy to wash their hands mid-meal, all of which are from the 16th century. We were also taught the history and significance behind all these fascinating artefacts.

Our final challenge of the day was learning about causes and impacts of global warming. We worked in teams to analyse the effect of global warming on climate change. Overall, it was a highly informative and interesting day, and we look forward to returning next time.
