
Read-aloud-a-thon

Skills developed during the day included researching online, conducting questionnaires to get real time facts and statistics and including anecdotal evidence


in their findings. The day ended with every group presenting in front of everyone!

Park's Invested in Nature

Park Community School is part of National Education Nature Park which aims to empower young people to make a positive difference to their own and the nation's future. Part of the mission is to transform the school grounds to improve biodiversity. In our Horticulture lessons, we have been working on an area of the school grounds which we will transform over the coming year. This project has begun with us using tools such as secateurs and loppers to remove leaves, bramble and sharp wood from our selected area. Once cleared, we will then be replacing this with pollinator friendly plants. We are also planting 400 trees!

We are delighted to tell you that Park has been awarded £10,000 to buy tools and equipment to make this project possible and we look forward to keeping you updated on our progress.



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Hair and Beauty


