


















Year 11 Music showcase

Havant Thicket Amhassadors Teach Year 7!



PE celebrating VE Day

We started lessons with students sharing the following text and images with a short discussion of the importance of sport in war time Britain and how sport continues to bring us together now.

During World War II sports played a vital role in maintaining morale and providing recreation for both civilians and service personnel. While professional sports were initially suspended, they gradually returned, with some leagues reorganising to accommodate wartime conditions. Football, in particular, became a unifying force, both within the military and among civilians, and played a significant role in raising funds for service charities.

While VE Day celebrations included many forms of recreation, the restart of football events in 1945-46 was a significant milestone. Where major sporting events had been suspended during the war, the return of the FA Cup and the Football League in 1946 signaled a return to a sense of normalcy and a boost to morale. Other sports like gymnastics also resumed after the war, with the "Victory Championships" being held in 1946.

VE Day & Computer Science — Codes, Communication & Cryptography

This engaging cross-curricular lesson explored the intersection of history and computer science, focusing on the critical role of codebreaking during World War II and its connection to VE Day. Students examined how pioneers like Alan Turing contributed to the Allied victory through computing innovations at Bletchley Park.

The lesson began with a VE Day Quiz to activate prior knowledge and spark curiosity. This interactive starter encouraged participation through historical questioning around VE Day, Alan Turing and the Enigma Machine. A mini lecture followed, offering students a concise yet informative look at computing's wartime evolution, including key figures, technologies (like the Colossus and Enigma), and the lasting impact of cryptographic breakthroughs.

The session concluded with a plenary reflection, prompting thoughtful discussion about the broader implications of computing during the war and its technological legacy today.

Student Engagement:

- Students were actively involved through various quizzes, discussions and research.
- The lesson encouraged cross-disciplinary thinking, connecting history and computer science in a meaninaful context.
- Extension tasks (poster creation and research on cyphers) offered opportunities for deeper learning beyond the classroom.
