And so a new term begins...

Autumn Term 2015 has been long awaited at Park Community School. We have spent over seven years getting ready to build and then constructing our new school. The new facilities are now used by students each day to support their learning and enrich their time at school.

We have a wonderful new theatre, lecture theatre, restaurant and activities on our playing field. Our new restaurant serves the best school meals prepared by our qualified chefs and their catering team, all at affordable prices. The classrooms include the latest large touch screen technology. We have invested heavily in computers, laptops, iPads and software to allow students to use a wide range of electronic devices. Our science labs and technology rooms have all been refurbished and house new equipment.

As well as learning on the school site we now have an industrial unit, a school small holding and are developing a construction skills centre in another part of Leigh Park. Our small holding is a new venture based on a local farm. Some students now follow Royal Horticultural Society courses in horticulture and can also care for our animals. We have chickens, goats and guinea pigs on our school site, as well as goats, sheep and pigs on our small holding.



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Springwood Park **Pre-School and Nursery**

Springwood Park Pre-School and Nursery has opened in new dedicated facilities at the front of Park Community School. The pre-school and nursery, jointly established by Services for Young Children and the school, provide a safe, exciting, fun and challenging environment for nursery children aged 0-2 years and pre-school children aged 2-5 years. The environment is full of colour, new interesting toys and qualified staff who have years of experience working in childcare. The nursery building holds a sensory room for babies to explore, a sleep room, and a free flow garden, where children are able to take toys outside if they wish, enabling them to have choice in the way and where they play; it really is a areat space for children to let off steam!

Springwood Park works closely with Park Community School using the school's excellent amenities, including PE sessions in the sports hall and cooked school meals in the fantastic school restaurant during a separate break time dedicated to the pre-school children.

Park Community School has recently added goats, chickens and guinea pigs to their site, which the young children can visit regularly.

Since opening its doors on 1 September, Springwood Park Pre-school and Nursery has settled into a routine. Through friendly caring staff and picture times lines which show 'what comes next', the children have established a daily routine, which works well with children who are anxious when away from home or who are simply missing their families. The local community interest in Springwood Park prior to opening in September was incredible with 28 different families joining the open day. Since opening, thanks to its great location, Springwood Park has had many 'walk in' families who live close by or who have heard through word of mouth about what the pre-school and nursery have to offer them and their children. So far 33 children are enrolled and it is expected that this number will grow as the term progresses. The programme recognises and rewards achievement, broadens experience, develops employability and communication skills. Park Community Ambassadors

What is an Ambassador? An ambassador is a representative from a year group who champions specific subjects and trains others. To become an ambassador students have to formally apply and receive training, thus providing them with an early experience of a valuable life skill.

Park Community School now has over 120 Sports Ambassadors at school, ranging from Year 7 to Year 11. The criteria for being a Sports Ambassador are:

- 1. Excellent manners and behaviour in and out of school
- 2. Totally reliable and superb uniform standards
- 3. Interested in sport and knowledgeable about their subject
- 4. Enthusiastic and positive at all times!

The Sports Ambassadors go out to every local primary school delivering high quality PE. They also support at sports days and help run training for the Young Leader Award.

Last year's ambassadors ran a huge athletics competition at the Mountbatten Centre, as well as the Havant, Portsmouth and Waterlooville Swimming Gala. They have also officiated at the Emsworth Cricket Tournament and always receive positive comments.

The first segment of the course is an intensive five day programme based at local fire stations. This initial course is designed to provide the fire service with a profile of the student enabling them to identify areas of development and agree the way forward with them.

This five day course involved our students working as a team to take part in fire drills, hose running, search and rescue. A practical session allowed the students to experience first-hand the tools required and processes involved in releasing casualties from a vehicle and ended with our students giving a demonstration of their skills to staff.



Tanzania Celebration

Park Community School Students have celebrated their trip of a lifetime to Tanzania with an evening filled with reminiscing and appreciation. Lord of the Flies



Greenpower

Fifteen years ago, Park Community School became involved in the earliest days of the Greenpower Project. This was part of a national project to get secondary school students building and racing electric go-karts. Our first car was promoted and sponsored by the local Rotary club and others.

Simon Waters, Park Community School's eLearning Coordinator, took over the project three years ago and found that the rules regarding the car had changed. For safety reasons the bottom of both the batteries and the driver had to be much closer to the ground. This was to lower the centre of gravity and reduce the risk of rolling. After one season's efforts at attempting to comply with the existing car now 12 years old, Park decided to opt for a new car, using the Greenpower official kitcar to make sure we were within the rules.

Flavours of Autumn



It's getting colder, the rain becomes a constant presence, the wind begins to howl and it's time for Mother Nature to prepare for hibernation. For the catering team at Park Community School it's that time again, where the kitchen is the warmth and heart of the school. Hearty food is the order of the day, warming cold hands and keeping children positive and fuelled for the day.

During the summer we were very busy preparing our gardens with fresh herbs and vegetables ready to harvest in autumn to make some lovely warming meals. Broccoli, chard, parsnips, carrots, cauliflower, thyme, rosemary, curry plant are just a few of the ingredients available at this time of year.

Here is a winter warmer recipe for you to try from our Head Chef - Steven Cross.

Ingredients

- 2 tbsp vegetable oil
- 50g butter

- 2 white onions, chopped
- 2 cloves of garlic chopped
- 2 tsp ground coriander
- 800g carrots, peeled and chopped
- 1.2litre vegetable stock
- 1 small bunch of fresh coriander
- 1 tsp cumin seeds
- 1 red chilli
- 1 large sprig curry Leaves

Step 1

Warm a large heavy based pan on the stove, add the vegetable oil and butter and allow the butter to foam and slightly colour.

Step 2

Add the chopped white onion and garlic, allow to cook gently, until soft. Step 3

Now increase the heat adding curry leaves, carrots and chilli, allow to cook and try to colour the carrots, they need to colour but not burn (This will take about 10 minutes) Step 4

Now add the ground coriander and cumin seeds. Spices need to cook out so their full flavour is released, allow to cook for 5 minutes. Step 5

Add the stock and allow to simmer gently until the carrots are very soft. Step 6

Once the carrots are cooked add the small bunch of fresh coriander and blend until smooth, the longer you blend, the better the soup. Step 7

Ready to serve with some nice fresh bread and butter.
