### EBP South – Amazing People Awards

Park Community School was nominated for the secondary school award in the EBP South Amazing People Awards. EBP South promotes enterprise and employability and we are delighted to have won.

Sarah Coles, Head of Information Advice and Guidance, and Rights, Respect and Responsibility, said "young people need to be prepared for a world which is rapidly changing. Many of the jobs they will do when they leave school do not yet exist and they will probably have several jobs during their lifetime. It is therefore essential that schools and teachers are at the heart of careers education for young people, ensuring that they receive the guidance and motivation needed to lead them towards a successful career".

The purpose of this generous donation is to fund apparatus in horticulture where glass is instrumental in the mechanics of a growing project. The project will involve using Victorian style cloches that can artificially change the environment in which seeds, cuttings and plants will be grown under glass and compared to those propagated in a natural environment. Differences in growth and survival rate, the advantages and disadvantages of propagating each in both environments will then be recorded.

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## Family Challenge Day

October 21st was Challenge Day for students at Park Community School. All students were involved in a whole day spent with their year group, covering various areas to push them out of their comfort zones, exploring areas that enable them to make positive choices in life.

Year 7 spent the day discussing bullying in its various guises and how it could be addressed in school. At the end of the day the whole year group came together to share what they had produced to promote anti-bullying. Some sang songs, some recited poetry and others showed their fantastic posters.

Year 8's day consisted of a series of talks and demonstrations by potential employers which was coordinated by the Education Business Partnership. This gives them an idea of how life would be in the world of work and helps them to make decisions about their subject options for next year.

Year 9's had an informative day learning about drugs, alcohol and sex education. Their day started with speakers from the Samaritans talking to them about the work they do and how they can help themselves if feeling low. They also had speakers from our local drug and alcohol rehabilitation centre who shared their real life stories with them, students were greatly moved by their bravery in sharing their experiences with alcohol and drugs. They also had a talk from Southern Domestic Abuse service to enlighten them on the dangers of abusive relationships and how to keep themselves safe.

Year 10's worked all day on the aspects of positive choices as they reach adulthood. PC Janet Stone started their day off by talking about making positive choices and where bad choices could lead them. They also looked at body image and why people aspire to be like others and why sometimes they make the wrong choices. They also explored the responsibilities of parenthood and how this event can change your life. They had motivational speaker Ian Rose, Paralympian, in to talk to them about overcoming obstacles and how to achieve your goal.

Year 11's had a day working on revision skills, with a memory skill workshop led by the Learning Performance Group. They also had Maths' revision sessions and learnt to apply their memory skills to their Maths education.



## Cosmology, Galaxy Evolution & Gravitation

Park Community School was given the opportunity to host ICG, a research institute at the University of Portsmouth that is devoted to topics in cosmology, galaxy evolution and gravitation, to give Year 7 students the chance to experience Space in 3D, within an Astrodome structure.

### Hampshire Book Award Event



Ten year 9 students enjoyed a spine-tingling talk from author Jonathan Stroud at Winchester Guildhall in November. Having helped judge the Hampshire Book Award earlier in the year, the students were there to see Jonathan collect the award for his winning book, The Screaming Staircase.

Along with other students across Hampshire, Park students read and reviewed six very different titles. Books on this year's shortlist ranged from a World War I story set in Gallipoli to a contemporary thriller about a murderous religious cult. However, it was a spooky tale of teenage ghost hunters that secured the most votes in the end.

As well as explaining his pathway to becoming a professional writer, Jonathan showed students how he used folklore and traditional tales in his stories. Katie Roberts, 9CSp, said "I was interested to hear how an author goes about starting a book and to learn that he began by writing just one scene instead of planning the whole plot in advance".
