First Place for Park's creation

Just after the Easter break, nine students from Park went to RAF Odiham to take part in the Regional Finals of the Race for The Line Competition, in conjunction with the Bloodhound Project, which aims to break the world land speed record.

On arrival the students were given a talk from the Bloodhound representatives about their attempt to break the land speed record and travel at over 1000mph.

The students set about making their own cars without support or guidance, which the teachers Mrs Conner & Mr Payne found a challenge, and they were fantastic.

During our lunchbreak all cars were checked to see if they complied with regulations before being taken out onto the runway for testing. We had a guided tour of one of the many Chinook helicopters at the Naval Base, and watched them take off and land. All of the students loved it as they were learning different things that they would not normally learn in school.

The students and teachers then watched eagerly as all the rocket cars were set off and out of the 30 other cars from both primary and secondary schools, we came...... FIRST!! With a speed of 44mph. Gary Handley, Year 7 student worked alone on his car and won! We even had a bit of controversy with other schools contesting our win! Our other teams didn't do too bad and had speeds of over 35mph.





Gary has a place at the National Finals in June at the Santapod race track with a chance at winning a trip to South Africa to see the actual Bloodhound car's land speed attempt. He will race against 10 other schools so we are in with a chance! Jasmine Bone, Year 9

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Work Experience Information

Private placements, ones that you have sourced yourself, need to be checked once you have handed in the paperwork, complete with the employer's insurance details. If you don't hear from Mrs Reynolds approximately one week after handing it in, this means the company's insurance has been validated and you are sorted – WELL DONE!

• Your mentor will receive paperwork for you once the employer has agreed they can give you a position.

- You will then need to phone the
- employer to arrange an interview
- Take the form to be completed by the employer at the interview
- Ensure your parents have also signed the form

• Return the completed form to student reception

Now you're finished - WELL DONE!

For information NO students will be in school for the two weeks; any who do not have a placement arranged will be put on the alternative WEX programme. This alternative programme will not be as rewarding or give you the sense of being in the work place as the placements will do. So we strongly encourage all students to have a work experience placement in place.

Tips for Revision

1. Make notes: when you read something and turn it into your own words, your brain begins to process it and you are more likely to remember the information. Create revision cards with a few notes for each topic that you revisit again and again.

2. Use post its and stick key words or facts around your room, so you are seeing them frequently

3. Chunk your learning: You will be much more successful if you try to remember and rehearse one or two facts before gradually adding another and so on.

4. Past papers: exam boards tend to use the same question types over and over again. Using past papers to practice questions will mean you will be rehearsing your timing and responses for the real exam.

5. Create mind maps: using key ideas and then exploring them, linking them by colour or pictures is a great way of visually recording information to help you revise. **Mrs Capaldi**

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Oarsome Chance Rowing



Park students finally had a chance to get out on the water to row after five months training!

Once at Northney Marina we were lucky enough to meet up with a team call WIGHTLIGHTNING. These are a team of four guys who will be racing across the Atlantic. They will set off in December leaving from the Canaries and hope to land in Antigua after less than two months at sea.

The first time this was done was in 1966 by a rower called Sir Chay Blyth,

it took him over 92 days and faced waves of over 50 foot, and was he nearly starved. This is such a physical challenge that more people have been into space or climbed Mt Everest.

The boat is 8 metres long and weighs 350kg, however once loaded with equipment and supplies the weight is over 1000kg. The boat has two



sleeping and storage compartments. The crew will take it in turn to sleep and row in pairs, they will have two hours off, which is their time to sleep, eat and make repairs.

After meeting the team from WIGHTLIGHTNING we took on our own challenge by getting into the



skiffs and having a row around Northney Marina without hitting any of the boats that are moored up. This went without any incident and looks promising. Over the next few weeks the students will be spending more time on the water and getting further around the Langstone Harbour. The main aim will be to get into a condition for when we can get onto the open waters and take on the challenge of rowing around Hayling Island **Mr Pritchard**


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Electron Microscope at Portsmouth University

Ten Year 9 students were given the amazing opportunity of visiting Portsmouth University to see their electron microscope. They have been learning about cells in class and had asked if there was any way they could visit a real electron microscope.

On arrival our group were asked to don white lab coats so we all felt like real scientists! We were given a talk by Professor Cragg, about the lab and some of the research they have been doing and then the students were able to view a spider under a light microscope although some were too afraid to look!

We then went into the small room which houses the electron microscope. The students were



taught how to change the magnification and then even had a chance to drive the microscope



themselves - all £70,000 worth! They were able to take photos of a very small creature similar to a termite which was only 1mm long. They were fascinated by how such a small creature could look so different under the microscope and surprised by the fact that they could even see other even smaller creatures that were living on it!

We then had a tour of the some of the labs and were amazed about the amount of equipment they had in each one. Many of the students have aspirations to study Science at university so it was amazing trip and opportunities to see what life after school could be like!

Jamie Allen, Year 9 said "It was amazing to see how small the creature was when it came out of the microscope".

Owen Wheatley, Year 9 said "I really understand how to convert units now as I could see the difference on the screen".

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Bring Your Own Picnic

Recipe by Steven Cross, Head Chef Bring on the sun with Minted Lamb Kebabs!

Finally summer is starting to arrive, bringing with it the beautiful warm sun, and the occasional downpour! This is a very exciting time as our school market garden is now fully planted and we are beginning to see some great results.

The school bees are now out collecting pollen and producing their beautiful honey and our school pigs are growing very fast and enjoying the warmer weather.

This time of year is a very fruitful time with a great bounty of produce at a chef's disposal. At home why not try growing your own and grab some tomatoes or strawberry plants and enjoy the fare?

Ingredients

Lamb Kebab

- 250g Minced Lamb
- 1 Red Onion (Diced)
- 2 Cloves of Garlic (Pureed)
- Half tsp Cumin Seeds
- 10 Mint leaves
- 1 tsp Wholegrain Mustard
- Salt and Pepper

Method

1. Firstly, place the minced lamb into a large mixing bowl and season well with salt and pepper.

2. Now add the diced onion, garlic puree, cumin seeds, mustard and shredded mint leaves and really get in there with both hands pushing all the ingredients together.

3. You can mould these beautiful lamb kebabs many ways so make your own choice and either ball the mixture, mould them around a presoaked skewer or even long rosemary sticks if you're feeling adventurous.

4. Allow the kebabs to rest in the fridge a few hours before cooking, in this time make your cucumber salad.

Cucumber Salad

- 1 Cucumber
- 2 Cloves of Garlic
- 10 Mint leaves
- 1 Red Onion
- 3 tbls Natural yoghurt
- 2 tsp Olive oil

Serve in a warm pitta bread, toasted flat bread or chargrilled tortilla wrap.

5. Now for the tasty salad peel your cucumber into long ribbons - with a sharp peeler.

6. Slice your red onion, shred your mint leaves and puree or chop the garlic.

7. Add all the cut ingredients into a bowl and mix together adding the yoghurt to bind.

8. Now allow to cool in the fridge.

9. Cook the kebabs in a large heavy frying pan until golden brown and toast a pitta bread on the open flames of the stove or a grill.

10. Now serve the tasty lamb kebab in the pitta, top with our cucumber salad and drizzle with olive oil!

For me this is a great taste of early summer and a really easy, healthy lunch or dinner. Why not try cooking all this on the BBQ for an awesome chargrilled and smoky hit?
