LACA Secondary School Catering Team of the Year 2018

On Thursday 12 July 2018
Park Community School was named Secondary School
Catering Team of the Year at the Lead Association for Catering in Education
Awards (LACA) held at the Hilton Birmingham
Metropole.

Every year the LACA Awards for Excellence acknowledge individuals and teams of people who continue to make a real difference in education catering. Good management, strong performance and high achievement is recognised.



Park Community School are proud to be 'Much More Than Just a School' and their catering team encompass this through providing affordable, quality food throughout the year including Christmas Day. Catering from nursery through to retirement, their passion shines through in providing free meals for their community through the MUNCH programme in the school holidays.

The school are very proud of the achievements of the catering team which also include:

- Soil Association Food for Life Gold Award (one of three secondary schools in England to achieve this)
- Eat Out, Eat Well Gold Award (Hampshire County Council)
- Fair Trade Awards accredited Fair Active and Fair Achiever school
- Reached the finals of Essential Cuisines Britain's Best Brigade 2017 and came second
- Educatering Excellence Awards 2016 Winner Newcomer of the Year Award Steven Cross.

Headteacher, Christopher Anders said;

"From the moment we decided to employ our own catering team the school has never looked back. We provide affordable, good quality nutritious food for our students, staff, visitors and members of our community. We are delighted to receive this award that recognises the hard work of our catering team over the last four years".

Bushcraft Experience

Park students learnt how to make and work safely with fire and how to make a fire and leave no trace on the environment. They were amazed that some sticks, a small piece of cotton wool and some Vaseline could produce a fire good enough to keep warm by and to cook on. The fires they made each day were used to cook their lunch on, and at the end of the day the areas were left with little to no trace of them having ever been there.

They also learnt some very impressive knife and saw skills, which allowed them to produce tent pegs and stakes for their living/working area canopy and their food preparation/service canopy. They took this a stage further to enable them to build a trestle table and benches, all of which were fully collapsible in order for the structure to be taken down in less than 20 minutes and stored to prevent vandalism. This was the only source of disappointment for the two days, that their work could not be made permanent due to the rangers' concerns of mistreatment by others in the community.

The students displayed excellent team working and social skills over the two days and all of the adults involved were blown away by their work ethic. As an example, at the start of the second















day the students came straight down the path, said "Good morning" to Ian who was leading the two days and went straight to work setting up the site! No prompting was needed. They were a credit to both themselves and the school.



We have made the difficult decision to raise the cost of a school meal to 2.30, an increase of 15p per meal. This increase is in line with all other Hampshire County Council schools and will allow us to continue to provide high quality, freshly cooked, healthy meals at an affordable price.

Red Cross - Make Your Move Competition

On Sunday, 3 June, 20 dance students took part in the 'Make Your Move' Red Cross dance competition at Aldershot. The aim of the piece was to link it with the work of the Red Cross and we decided to focus our piece on refugees. Our students had been rehearsing since January and all their hard work paid off as we came first, winning the senior category, putting us through to the Finals at the O2.

On Sunday, 8 July, we took our Red Cross finalists to London to perform in the grand finals at the O2 Arena. They performed their hearts out and although they did not win overall, they did achieve an award for the best use of props! This was an excellent opportunity for our students and one they will remember forever.

Students managed to raise £419 through sponsorship from family and friends, which will be donated to the British Red Cross.



Big Ideas Day – Regional Finals

Park Community School was brilliantly represented at the 'Solutions for the Planet Big Ideas' regional final day by a tenacious group of students in Year 9. A huge well done to Jacob, Oliver, Ryan and Owen, for a fantastic group effort. Unfortunately, they did not progress to the national competition level, but they did get a special commendation for their idea and how they developed it in such a short period of time. They were up against schools that had a lot more time to work on their project so did incredibly well.

The boys were developing an idea of a filter that could be fitted to buses and cars to reduce the nitrous oxide gases emitted from the exhaust. They looked into existing products of a similar nature, the cost to make such a product, the materials that would have to be used and where their target group was. This all came after researching the issue of pollution in built up areas and the need for such a




product. With the help of a mentor from Tarmac they put together a five minute presentation to pitch their idea to a panel of judges at Portsmouth University. The feedback they received was very positive, hence the special commendation.

The time and effort the four boys have put in has earned them a Bronze Crest award, which is a nationally recognised Science award. Well done and congratulations to Jacob, Oliver, Ryan and Owen.

Greenpower's biggest ever entry of cars...

72 Entries and 40 in our category! Practice went smoothly and all seemed well. Students were nervous but excited about the new grand prix style start.

Race 1 - 'Team Spirit 2' and 'Chase' got a good start and off they went. 'Keep Up' sadly sat on the start line with a main power cable problem. After a 10 minute fix it was back out and flying. Good pit changes from all teams and all three cars were going really well. 'Keep Up' managed to catch up really well even after the problem at the start. Kit Car category (40 cars) results race 1 - all three of our cars lasted the 90



minutes and finished the race. 'Team Spirit' 25th, 'Chase' 37th and 'Keep Up' 24th.

Problems fixed, batteries changed for Race 2! Great start by all. All cars looking good and moving well. Slick pit stops including a 14 second driver change!

Kit Car category (40 cars) results Race 2 - All three of our cars again lasted the 90 minutes and finished the race. However a massive improvement on all cars. 'Team Spirit 2' 20th, 'Chase' 36th, 'Keep Up' 1st! This included a record distance for Park of 33.8 miles. It also meant automatic qualification to the national final!

Overall results for the combination of both races:

- 'Team Spirit 2' 21st
- 'Chase' 37th
- 'Keep Up' 3rd and another trophy for the cabinet and a medal for every team member!

A big thank you to Park teachers who attended and most importantly Mr Bird from Tech, whose effort on the cars throughout May/June made it possible for our students to race.

Most of all thanks to our students - AMAZING!

Greenpower Team visit Ford Dunton Technical Centre

The Greenpower Team had another early start and a long drive up to Basildon, Essex to visit Ford Dunton Technical Centre. This is Ford motor company's development centre and test track. Dunton has been responsible for the development of the ECOnetic range of vehicles, and has contributed to development of the EcoBoost range of engines.

The students were lucky enough to race on the test track. This was a new challenge as there was a banked bend and very tight chicane. The chicane proved difficult with many crashes but no serious injuries, although slight damage to one of our cars. Problem solving and intuition enabled the car to become race worthy again.

The format of the day was two 90 minute endurance races with the longest distance travelled

being the main aim of the day. Race 1- all three cars got off to a brilliant start but it was clear that 'Keep Up' with a higher gear ratio stood a good chance and started to take up the lead. A brilliant race by all cars and team members gave Park their first top 3 finish. Race 1 results were: 'Keep Up' 3rd overall and 1st kitcar, 'Team Spirit 2' 9th overall and 7th kitcar, with 'Chase' 18th overall and 15th kitcar.

Race 2 started with a a few very near misses on the tricky chicane but 'Keep Up' was flying, 'Chase' was moving up the table and 'Team Spirit 2' was the fastest lapping car after 1 hour 20 min moving the car up the table to finish strong. Race 2 results were: 'Keep Up' second overall and 1st kitcar, 'Team Spirit 2' 4th overall and 3rd kitcar, with 'Chase' 19th overall and 16th kitcar.

An amazing day and experience for all involved especially seeing the Ford Technical Centre as the learning links to future STEM careers could be realised by our team.

The overall results for the day:

- 'Keep Up' 1st kitcar, 3rd overall
- 'Team Spirit 2' 4th kitcar, 7th overall
- 'Chase' 16th kitcar, 19th overall

Park's Greenpower Team performed amazingly, We have never achieved so much in one race before. We won 4 trophies, a first, second and two third places as well as our entire team winning a bronze, silver and gold medal! Our next aim is to enhance our car 'Chase' to improve its average speed to make it more competitive.

Bring on race 3 of the season in September at Dunsfold Aerodrome (Top Gear test track!)





Art & Photography Final Project




On 10th/11th of July, Year 10 Photography students travelled to Southsea to take photographs for their Structures unit.

We camped at Arromanches, home of the British Mulberry Harbour. Its remains still standing as a monument to the tenacity and ingenuity of the Allied Invaders.

As well as visiting and filming at the five major beaches the team also visited the major sites of Pegasus Bridge, Point du Hoc, Loungessur-Mer and, of course, Bayeux.





But the most poignant moments were while visiting the five major cemeteries. The students were amazed at the number of French cemeteries, relaxed by the informality of the Canadian cemetery, impressed by the pristine British cemetery, awestruck by size of the American cemetery and reverent at the German cemetery. The respect that the students showed at these times was a credit to the school.

STEM trip to Winchester Science Museum

On 11th July a small group of Year 7 and 8 students were lucky enough to attend a free STEM event at Winchester Science Centre. The day started with some free time to explore and we then attended a workshop with the Hampshire & Isle of Wight Air Ambulance Service where some of our students volunteered to give first aid to a 'patient' and learnt how the volunteers respond to emergencies using the helicopter to reach patients in remote places. Some of our students had the opportunity to wear the full crew gear, which was a little on the big side!

In the afternoon we went on an expedition, exploring our solar system and the universe in the planetarium. We finished the day with a STEM speed networking event where students met STEM Ambassadors from a range of professions who spoke about their careers.

Year 7 – The Wardrobe



Have you ever wondered what a 500-year-old wardrobe has seen, where it has been and what has been kept hidden within it over all those years? Well, now you don't have to. Year 7 at Park are currently working their way through Sam Holcroft's text 'The Wardrobe', which begins during The War of the Roses and traces one spacious wardrobe throughout history – all the way up to modern times. Year 7 will hear its secrets and share in its trials and tribulations across ten action packed scenes. 'The Wardrobe' not only gives students the opportunity to explore challenging contexts and learn from the struggles of our ancestors; it allows them to express themselves through stage and acting as well.

Year 8 – Voices of Protest



We all have a voice; it's the most powerful tool we have. With it we can convince, comfort, argue, and even protest! Looking into challenging topics ranging from culture and race to more contemporary issues like gun laws and privacy settings, this unit is designed to encourage students to find their voice and express their views passionately and articulately. Culminating in a presentation of their choice, Voices of Protest will be developing students' empathy skills and broadening their horizons on challenging global topics.

Year 9 - GCSE Poetry

In preparation for their GCSE English Literature exam, Year 9 students are working their way through over 200 years of classic British poetry in 15 poems linked by the themes of Power and Conflict. This unit not only prepares students for their GCSE examination but teaches them how emotion flows through the written word. With opportunities to write their own poems alongside timeless pieces, students will master the nuances and the power of the world of poetry.

Park Parent Partnership

Homework Survey

Thank you to all the parents who completed the homework survey initiated by Mrs Russell in computer science.

Responses:

- Almost four out of five consider that we set students enough homework
- Over seven out of ten encourage their children to do homework straight after school or at school in one of the homework clubs available for them
- Nearly nine out of ten check on their child's homework each week
- Three quarters recognising that families have a significant impact on the child's academic progress
- Six out of ten said their children did between 1 and 5 hours homework each week
- Most comments about what else school could do to support their child's learning were similar to: 'Continue to support as you always do.'

There were some concerns about children sometimes having too many homeworks on one night and one or two parents wanted more information about homework e.g. what, when and how to help, as well as more help on how to log in or use the homework sites.

Research published by the DfE tells us that 2 hours homework per night is linked to achieving better results, especially in English, maths and science.

We will:

- Feedback the detailed findings to all teachers
- Provide students with planners to help them organise their homework and reminders on how to log in to MILK and MyMaths for example, in September.
- Ensure our website is up to date with tips, and key resources to help with homework as well as clear instructions on how to use MILK to track your child's homework.

Freshers Evening

A big thank you to all the parents who responded to our team of students interviewing you for your opinions at Freshers' Evening.

Responses:

- You found out about Freshers' Evening through a variety of means: personal letters [the most popular] Facebook, or fliers.
- All of you found us welcoming
- Everyone found the evening useful
- All thought the information packs clear and helpful
- Four out of five of you described yourselves as very clear about the school's policies and procedures. The remaining said they were 'fairly clear'
- There were no suggestions as to how to improve our partnership with you, although there was a request for a swimming pool.

Recipe by Steven Cross, Head Chef

Teriyaki Sesame Salmon with Mango & Chilli Salsa - served with Glass Noodle Salad & Thai style dressing

Ingredients

650g - Salmon Fillet

Teriyaki Glaze

- 1 Thumb of Ginger
- 2 Cloves of Garlic
- 1tbsp Reduced Salt Soy Sauce
- 1tbsp Honey
- 2tbsp Sesame Seeds

Thai Style Dressing

- 2 Limes
- 1tbsp Fish Sauce
- 3tbsp Rice Vinegar
- 1 Red Chilli
- 1 Clove of Garlic
- 1tbsp Honey

Mango & Chilli Glass Noodle Salad

- 400g Glass Noodles
- 300g Beansprouts
- 2 Carrots
- 2 Red Chillis
- 1/2 bunch Coriander
- 2 Red Onions
- 1 Mangoes
- 1 Pak Choi
- 2tbsp Sesame Seeds



Method

- 1. Begin by preparing your salmon fillet making sure you remove all pin bones and portion into 65g portions (elongate the cut by slicing at a sharp angle), after they are cut, lay onto a parchment covered tray.
- 2. Make the glaze finely chop the garlic and ginger, and work into a puree, add to a saucepan along with soy sauce and honey. Heat on the stove and reduce by a third, then leave to one side.
- 3. Soak the glass noodles in boiling water and allow to swell once ready, cool in cold water to prevent from over cooking.
- 4. To make the Thai Style Dressing, add to a mixing bowl the juice of 2 limes, fish sauce, honey, rice vinegar, chopped red chilli and sliced garlic, then whisk in the sesame oil to combine again, leave to the side to mix with salad later.

- 5. Now peel and cut the carrots into julienne strips, cut and slice the red chillis and red onions, chop the pak choi, slice the mango into long strips and add the chopped coriander and beansprouts to a large bowl.
- 6. Brush the now cooled teriyaki glaze onto the trayed salmon and sprinkle with sesame seeds, cook in a preheated oven at 200 degrees for 6 minutes, then remove and allow to rest.
- 7. Finishing the salad by mixing the cool noodles, vegetables, herbs and by adding the Thai style dressing.
- 8. Arrange the noodle salad onto a plate and top with your salmon.
